

Various authors. Jack Off, Publisher. Philadelphia: no date, perhaps late 1977, early 1978. Side stapled format. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 18 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. A punk and new wave zine from the Philadelphia area, presenting

straight up coverage of various acts. With contributions by Jack Off, Jay Schwartz, Roid Kafka and others. This issue with news/commentary/interviews on **The Stranglers**, **the Cramps**, The

**Reds**, **The A's**, **Elvis Costello** and others. GOOD condition. Moderate browning to the piece, a bit heavier along the extremities. Minor wrinkling and edgewear. \$125.00



#### 2. The Gun Rubber. Summer 1977. Issue #6.

Bower, Paul (editor) Paul Bower, Publisher. Sheffield, UK: 1977. Single stapled format. 11 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> by 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches. 32 pp., including covers. Printed on different colored and stock paper. Edited and written by Paul Bower,

Gun Rubber was an influential fanzine out of Sheffield, highlighted by Jon Savage in his survey of fanzines. Bower covered punk and new wave, predicting the rise of electronic and industrial music, including bands such as Human League and Cabaret Voltaire. This issue Bower calls out the hypocrisy of the punk movement, citing high costs of seeing bands, bands such as **the Clash** wearing designer punk fashions, etc. With pieces on **the Stranglers**, **the Damned** and others, as well as a short piece on a show performed by the **Sex Pistols** under the name **Tax Exiles**. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning, with minor wrinkling at the corners. \$250.00




### 3. London's Burning. No. 1. December, 1976

Ingham, John. John Ingham, Publisher. London: 1976. Single stapled at the upper left corner. 11 ¼ by 8 inches. 14 leaves, printed on single sides only. Collage, clip art and photos throughout. First, and only, issue of this zine "**by a Clash fan for Clash fans**." Created by **John Ingham**, a staff writer for the magazine Sounds where he published an interview in early 1976 with the **Sex Pistols** (See Poynor, Oh So Pretty, p. 59). GOOD+ condition. Minor toning. Some creasing and wrinkling at the corners. Old staple holes present, with minor rusting. Small rectangular glue stain on the upper rear cover. \$250.00

#### 4. Trash '77 No. 2 May 1977

Campbell, Craig. Craig Campbell, Publisher. Glasgow: 1977. Single stapled format, printed on slightly waxy feeling paper. 12 by 8 ¼ inches.

10 leaves, printed on single sides only. A few poorly reproduced photos throughout. A fanzine intended to "fill the gap left when Tony Drayton moved Ripped and Torn to London" (Poynor p. 130). This with short pieces and reviews of the Jam, Chelsea, Iggy Pop, Wayne County, The Clash and others. GOOD+ condition. Minor soiling and toning, with a few small rust stains to the rear cover. Several small tears along the front cover fore edge. Minor wrinkling/creasing. \$175.00






#### 5. Penetration No. 12

Welsh, Paul (editor and contributor). Penetration, Publisher. Stockport, UK: 1977. Wraps, side stapled, printed in red. 10 by 7 inches. 20 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. An issue of this zine that Welsh terms "a rock magazine" that covered a wide range of bands and genres, from Motorhead, Ted Nugent to the Sex Pistols, Suicide and others, as well as focusing on the Manchester scene. Short pieces

and/or photos of the Ramones, Iggy Pop, Ted Nugent, Wayne County, the Vibrators, the Mutants, etc. GOOD+ condition. Wrappers a bit wrinkled and creased, with minor toning. Extremities bumped. \$125.00



# 6. All the Young Dudes. Vol. 1, No. 6. (Perhaps June 1976).

Latzoni, Nick (editor). Lower Third Enterprise. Clifton, NJ: no date, perhaps 1976. Somewhat glossy paper, photo illustrated, covers. 15 by 11 inches. 20 pp. including covers. Apparent first issue of this fanzine, with confusing volume numbering (based on what little could be found on this zine, it appears it was issued June 1976, vol. 1, no. 6). Contains black and white photos (with a color cover face shot of Joey Ramone), with no text. Images of The Ramones, Blondie, New York Dolls, Television, Wayne County, Talking Heads, Heartbreakers, Tuff Darts, The Fast and the Miami. Photos by Nick Latzoni, Rick Jones, Mick Benson, Brad O'conner and Patti Young, portrayed with raw imagery capturing the then young punk scene. GOOD+ condition. Horizontal fold crease present. Minor toning and wrinkling. \$225.00


## 7. The Armagideon Times. #1.

No author given. No publisher, place or date, presumed London, 1979. Side stapled format on glossy style paper. 11 ¾ by 8 3/8 inches. 20 pages including covers. Black and white photos throughout, by Pennie Smith. First issue of this promotional fanzine issued by those associated with the Clash, featuring photos of the band, some lyrics, the story of



the Clash, etc., including short handwritten anecdotes by band members. The fanzine was published by Kris Needs and Robin Banks, two associates/friends of the band and financed by CBS records (see Berniere and Primois, p. 229 for previous info). GOOD+ condition. Faint spotting and foxing to the covers, with minor general browning. Very light wrinkling and creasing. \$125.00

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#### 8. Live Wire (Livewire) Number Six. June 1977.

Anger, Alan. London: 1977. Single stapled format. Approximately 11 <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> by 8 <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> inches. 20 pp., including covers. Black and white photos and clip art throughout. Written by Alan Anger, the vocalist for the band the Rowdies, Live Wire ran for 19 issues and offered interviews and commentary on the punk scene. This issue with pieces on **the Boys**, full page photos of **Johnny Rotten** and **Sid Vicious**, a piece by **Dee Generate**, a piece on the Ramones at the Roundhouse, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning. Light curling at the corners. Staple slightly rusted, with minor staining around it. \$125.00

### 9. Live Wire (Livewire) Number 7. July, 1977

Anger, Alan. London: 1977. Single stapled format. Approximately 11 <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> by 8 <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> inches. 9 leaves, including covers. Black and white photos and

clip art throughout. Issue seven, with pieces on **Defiant**, the Violators, **Sex Pistols**, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning. Light curling at the corners. Staple slightly rusted, with minor staining around it. \$125.00

#### 10. Biff! Bang!Pow! No. 1.

Fancher, Lisa. Biff! Bang! Bow!, Publisher. Sun Valley, CA: no date, circa

1978. Side stapled zine. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 20 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. First issue of this fanzine by Lisa Fancher, perhaps best known for founding Frontier Records in 1980, which promoted many influential punk and hardcore bands from the LA area, including the Circle Jerks, Suicidal Tendencies, Adolescents and many others. While originally working for mainstream rock journals,



she grew disillusioned with corporate control over coverage of bands, and eventually worked on or created fanzines such as this. Pieces on **The Dickies**, the Rich Kids and others. GOOD condition. Moderate browning along the extremities, with rusting at the staples. Top staple almost falling out. Light wrinkling. Some soiling and staining along the lower front cover, with a small tear at lower center edge. \$150.00




#### 11. Kid's Stuff 1.

No author given. Kid's Stuff, Publisher. Surrey, UK: no date, circa 1977. Single stapled zine. Approximately 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 5 leaves, printed on single sides only. Black and white photos throughout. Relying on photos and clipped/assembled text, this fanzine from the Surrey, UK area, often reported on the Manchester punk/new wave scene (with later issues, NOT this one, featuring writing by **Morrissey**). Morrissey cites his writings in Kid's Stuff as the vehicle through which he met his idol, Patti Smith, a meeting which left him, perhaps predictably, disappointed (see Rogan, "Morrissey and Marr"). This issue with commentary on the punk scene, the **Sex Pistols**, etc. Last page is a pinup of **The Ramones**, combining comic style imagery. VERY GOOD condition. Corners bumped and wrinkled. Light rusting near the staple. Bookstore price sticker on the center front cover. (Triggs, pp. 66). \$175.00

### 12. Kid's Stuff 6.

No author given. Kid's Stuff, Publisher. Surrey, UK: no date, circa 1977. Single stapled zine. Approximately 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 7 leaves, printed on single sides only. Black and white photos, collage and clip art throughout. Issue six, consisting primarily of clip art and clipped news bits relating to the Sex Pistols, as well as a piece on the **Heartbreakers**. VERY GOOD condition. Minor wrinkling and creasing along the top edge and corners, with a hint of toning. \$125.00




## 13. Blah Blah Woof Woof. No. 1. May, 1978

Alfonso, Ralph (editor). Blah Blah Woof Woof, Publisher. Toronto: 1978. Side stapled format with a brown and green printed front cover and light blue paper in the interior. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 12 pp., including covers. Photos throughout. Rear cover a poorly reproduced photo of **Blondie**. A zine from Toronto Canada, produced by Ralph Alfonso, a Canadian poet and producer (Diodes), as well as creator of several zines. This issue with news of the **B-Girls** making a record (with photo), news on the **Diodes**, **G-Rays** and others. VERY GOOD condition. Minor soiling. Light wrinkling at the corners. \$75.00

## 14. Hit and Run. Issue 1. July 77

Groff, Skip et al. Hit and Run Records, Publisher. Kensington, MD: 1977. Orange/yellow illustrated wraps. 8 ½ by 7 inches. 22 pp. A few small illustrations throughout. First issue of this fanzine that began as an adjunct to Skip Groff's record store Hit and Run. Combining elements of fanzines and radio tipsheets, this



was one of the first to document the burgeoning punk scene in the Washington, DC area. Skip Groff was an influential figure in the DC music scene, especially punk, serving as a record producer, seller and dj, and furthering the careers of many bands, including Minor Threat (see University of Maryland's holdings of Groff material for prior information. **Slickee Boys**, **Iggy Pop** and others in this issue. VERY GOOD condition. Minor wrinkling along the spine. A hint of rusting to the staples. \$125.00



#### 15. Gabba Gabba Gazette #4. September 1977.

Ramel, Mary Alice. Mary Alice Ramel, Publisher. Chicago: 1977. Side folding zine. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 26 pp. Black and white photos and illustrations throughout, many tipped in, as issued. Conceived of, written, edited and published by Mary Alice Ramel after attending a punk show at the noted Chicago club, La Mere Vipere, this zine covered the punk scene in Chicago, primarily through the La Mere venue. Early, if not the first, punk fanzine in Chicago. Issue number four, with news on Television, the Stranglers, the Police (not the British band), and other punk/new wave goings on in Chicago. GOOD+ condition. Minor to moderate toning. Light wrinkling. \$100.00

#### 16. Gabba Gabba Gazette #5. November 1977.

Ramel, Mary Alice. Mary Alice Ramel, Publisher. Chicago: 1977. Side folding zine. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 18 pp. Black and white photos and illustrations throughout. Pieces on the **Mumps** and the **Popperz**; a cartoon illustrating the words to the **Ramones Blitzkrieg Bop**; an article on **reggae** by Jah Sky, etc. GOOD+ condition. Minor to moderate toning. Light wrinkling. \$100.00




### 17. Chainsaw Fanzine. No. 1. July/August 1977

Chainsaw, Charlie. Chainsaw, Publisher. London: 1977. Single stapled format. Approximately 11 <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> by 8 <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> inches. Perhaps one of two hundred copies. 9 leaves, printed on single sides only. Black and white photos and illustrations throughout. First issue of 'one of the most aesthetically influential fanzines of the British punk and post-punk periods,' with graphics that 'prefigured eighties modernity' (Berniere and Primois p. 225-226). Triggs cites it as a link between the counterculture of the 1960s and punk of the 1970s (Triggs, Scissors and Glue, p. 79). **The Jam** and the Roxy album, reviews of the **Ramones** album, etc. in this issue. VERY GOOD condition. Some creasing and faint indents near the staple corner, with the staple slightly rusted. Minor curling at the corners. \$175.00


## 18. Various Authors. Sniffin' Glue...and other Rock n' Roll Habits For Pinheads and Surfers. #7. February 1977.

Various Authors. Sniffin' Glue, Publisher. London: 1977. Single staple at upper left corner. 11 3/8 by 8 ¼ inches. 13 leaves, printed primarily on versos only, with the first and last leaves printed on the rectos as well. Black and white photos throughout. Founded by Mark Perry, this zine ran for a total



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of 14 issues and 'identified itself as for punks and a mouthpiece for their music and anger.' (Triggs p. 50). Sniffin' Glue incorporated and instigated the DIY style associated with the punk movement and fanzines, influencing many future fanzines, while using traditional press reporting techniques undercut with subversive humor. Interviews and articles on **The Adverts**, the **Gorillas**, a **Don Letts** interview, news on the Roxy Club, etc. A **Damned** pin-up makes up the last leaf. With photography by Harry T. Murlowski. GOOD condition. Moderate creasing and wrinkling at the upper left corner, with some curling at the corners. Last leaf with a large crease. Light browning, mostly along the extremities. (Triggs, p. 50-51; Berniere and Primois p. 223-224; Savage p. 202). \$150.00



## 19. Ripped and Torn. February 1978. Issue No. 10.

D., Tony (editor). Rough Trade. London: 1978. Single stapled collage/clip art decorated wraps, in red, black and white. 11 5/8 by 8 ¼ inches. 24 pp. including covers. Clip art/collage and black and white photos throughout. Produced by Tony Drayton, this zine 'covered the punk scene in both Glascow and London,' and 'was at the time recognized by other producers as a frontrunner for its attempt to offer a broader understanding of punk's political agenda' (Triggs p. 57). Issue 10, with an interview (translated from the French) with **David Bowie**, commentary on **Richard Hell**, the **Ramones**, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor fading and wrinkling. \$100.00



#### 20. Slash. August 1977. Volume 1 Number 3.

Samiof, Steven; Nissen, Melanie (editors). Various authors. Slash, Publisher. Los Angeles: 1977. Newspaper tabloid format. 32 pp, including covers. Black and white photos throughout. Approximately 15 by 11 ½ inches. Slash Magazine was a Los Angeles based fanzine, published from 1977-1980, and from which the record label Slash Records grew (Triggs, p. 66). Claude Bessy, a senior editor at Slash stated 'It started as a bluff, we were pretending there was an L.A. scene when there was no scene whatsoever. The magazine was it.' (Berniere and Primois p. 219). Issue three, featuring interviews with the **Germs**, the **Zeros**, **Devo** and the **Mumps**; many short record reviews, reviews of shows, etc. GOOD+ condition. Moderate browning to the paper. Minor soiling. \$100.00





21. Punk Magazine. #2. March, 1976.

Holmstrom, John (editor). Punk Publications. New York: 1976. Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches that unfolds into a large journal style format measuring a little over 16 inches tall by 11 inches wide. 20 pp., including covers. Issue number 2 of this influential New York magazine, founded by Legs McNeil and John Holmstrom. Holmstrom, a cartoonist influenced by underground comics, 'dreamed of being for the punks what Crumb had been for the hippies.' (Berniere and Primois p. 217). Features on The Talking Heads, Patti Smith, Television, etc. as well as short reviews on various punk bands, cartoons and commentary satirizing punk culture and life in general. GOOD condition. Blue ink spatter/staining along the extremities (seen in several copies of this). Minor soiling and browning. Two 2 to 2 ½ inch tears along the side fold, with some chipping and associated creasing. \$100.00



Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches. 41 pp. Issue number three of this fanzine featuring a front cover illustration of Joey Ramone. With an interview with the noted underground comix artist **R. Crumb**, articles on the Ramones, David Johansen, the Heartbreakers, etc. GOOD condition. Several lines of scrawled writing in blue in to the lower front cover. Some soiling, minor toning and wrinkling to the covers. One inch split at the upper spine. \$80.00

#### 23. Punk Magazine. #6. October, 1976.

Holmstrom, John (editor). Punk Publications. New York: 1976. Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches that unfolds into a large journal style format measuring a little over 16 inches tall by 11 inches wide. 24 pp., including covers. Issue 6 featuring a photoplay/live action cartoon 'The Legend of Nick Detroit,' that consists of panels of photos starring various punk figures in a crime caper, interspersing comic style art and captions with photos. Included are **Richard Hell**, **David Johansen**, **David Byrne** and other notables. FAIR/GOOD condition. Minor to moderate uneven browning to the covers, with some soiling and dark scuffs. Moderate wrinkling. Remains of mailing label on the rear cover. 3 inch tear along the lower spine, with a small triangular piece missing from the lower front corner. Some creasing. \$50.00

Apparent second issue of this zine from London, edited and authored by a young woman, Terri. This issue with a lengthy review of the album Closer by Joy Division; a piece on Echo and the Bunnymen, and an article and



Black and white photos and clip art throughout. Second issue of this fanzine that featured "groups, poets, etc. from Sheffield and it's surrounding areas." With some politics




mixed in, apparently to the chagrin of some readers of the first issue. With pieces or photo features on **Throbbing Gristle**, **They Must be Russians**, **Vice Versa**, **Musical Janeens**, **Veiled Threat**, **Minny Pops**, **Comsat Angels** and others. A fanzine devoted to skinhead culture profiling bands and the "average" skinhead in each issue. Distributed out of the shop Last Resort, a store devoted to skinheads. This issue with pieces on the poet **Mick Turpin**, **Peter and the Test Tube Babies**, tattooing, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning and wrinkling. \$100.00



The Bags, Mondellos, Mean Behavior and others. GOOD+ with



Captain Callous; Eddie Snide; Pig Ignorant. Grinding Halt, Publisher. Reading, UK: no date, perhaps early 1981. Side stapled format. 12 by 8 1/2 inches. 24 numbered pages. Black and white photos and illustrations throughout. A zine offering somewhat acerbic look at the new wave and last vestiges of the punk scene, focusing




primarily on interviews and record reviews. Siouxsie and the Banshees, the Buzzcocks, Mo-Dettes, New Order, U2, The Clash, Motorhead, Madness, XTC and others featured in this issue. GOOD+ condition. No author given. New York Rocker, Publisher. New York: 1979. Side folding newspaper. 16 ¼ by 11 ¼ inches. 28 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. The first issue of this newspaper style photo zine issued by the magazine New York Rocker, featuring photographs of punk bands, individuals and other associated with punk, new wave and no wave. The New York Rocker was started by Alan Betrock in 1976, with Andy Schwartz taking over in 1977. The paper mixed irony with more traditional rock journalism, with a focus on New York based musicians. (Berniere and Primois, p. 218). This issue with photos of **Joey Ramone**, **Blondie**, **James Chance**, **Richard Hell**, **Talking Heads**, **Tuxedo Moon**, **William Burroughs**, **Lydia Lunch** and others. Short page of commentary at the front. GOOD condition. Moderate browning. Some creasing. Moderate spotting/foxing and staining along the lower front cover and upper front fore edge, with a few fore edge margins in the interior with the same spotting. Light soiling. \$55.00



Clip art, collage and reproduced black and white photos throughout. Issue three of this British fanzine published from 1979 to 1981, using collage and varying typographic formats to present a visually appealing review of various punk and new wave acts. As Triggs notes "a mixture of typographic styles gives [it] its own unique style," with reading conventions subverted by its layout (Triggs p. 76/77). Several pages devoted to the **Damned**, with news of **Killing Joke**, **the Cure**, **the Clash** and many others. GOOD+ condition. Minor toning, mostly along the extremities. Slight creasing along the top left corner. \$60.00

## 32. Rapid Eye Movement. Standard Issue Three. Summer 1980.

Various authors. Rapid Eye Movement, Publisher. (United Kingdom): 1980. Illustrated wraps. Side stapled. 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 32 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. 'An industrialculture post-punk fanzine,' (Triggs p. 78) with this issue containing interviews with the anarcho-punk band **Crass**, as well as a lengthy interview with



Andy Warhol. An apparent impromptu meeting, the interviewer and Warhol discuss a range of topics, including the Velvet Underground, punk music and culture, and a variety of subjects relating to art and pop culture. Also present is a piece on the work of Philip K. Dick, the Chefs, Wire, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Light browning to the paper. A hint of soiling to the covers. Berniere and Primois p. 230. \$55.00





Faull, Trev. Trev Faull, Publisher. Romford, UK: 1979. Side stapled format. 8 ½ by 6 inches. 30 pp., including covers. Poorly reproduced photos and clip art throughout. A music fanzine by Trev Faull, reflecting his eclectic tastes, with this issue containing a few articles/reviews on new wave music, including the Teardrop Explodes, as well as many new wave and punk singles.

This issue with a piece by Elijah Muhammad, "On the Right of Self Defense," asserting the rights of African-Americans to defend themselves against human and dog attacks. Also present is the text of a message sent to Los Angeles mayor Sam Yorty by Malcolm X in which he says white klansmen are disguised as police officers, recalling his harassment by police, at gunpoint, upon his arrival to Los Angeles. Malcolm X had gone to LA to attend the trial of 14 Muslims being tried for assault. This includes a small photo of Malcolm X accompanying the article, as well as one of him on the rear cover. Another article points out the use of the death penalty in the US as a means of "legal murder" or lynching of African-Americans and includes several graphic photos of men being lynched. Accompanying this is a satirical piece highlighting the racist laws around defining an African-American by the amount of "black" blood they have. Also addressed in this issue is the ongoing civil rights struggle in Birmingham, Alabama, including the incarceration of protesting children, and the actions of Jackie Robinson. This article includes a photo of **Dr. Martin Luther King Jr**. The rear cover, advertising for subscriptions to the newspaper also features a political

cartoon captioned "But never a word about self-defense" that portrays Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on his knees next to a man bleeding while being beaten by police, with Dr. King saying "If there is any blood spilled in the streets, let it be our blood." 




