
A photo documentation of various punk bands and punk scenesters of the San Francisco area, by James Stark, a pioneer photographer of the San Francisco punk scene. Stark was drawn to photography while in the Army, taking art classes in New York while serving at Fort Dix in New Jersey. After his stint, he documented hippies and the subculture of New York City during the mid-1960s, moving to San Francisco in 1968 to work as a graphic artist. He got his start in the punk scene by photographing the band Crime, and recognizing that the punk scene was not covered in the mainstream media, focused his work on the bands and people/fans around them (see interview in the Visilia Times Delta, October 21, 2016 for previous info).
