Punk Fanzines, Art Zines, Underground Newspapers

Welcome to our fifth catalog, with the usual assortment of punk fanzines and related material, including a 30+ issue run of RAT Subterranean, the underground newspaper from New York. Fanzines include two No Wave zines, No and Beat It!; No Exit featuring Tony Stark photography; Zone V, presenting DC area photos; a few issues of Punk, later issues of Ripped and Torn; Sluggo! etc. Writing by William Burroughs can be found in Search and Destroy, as well as RAT. R. Crumb comix appear in the first issue of Yarrowstalks, as well as King Bee.




1. Beat It! #2.

Brown, Rick; Gorton, Julia (art). Beat It, Rick Brown, presumed publisher. New York: 1977. Three staples along the left edge. 14 leaves, including covers. 8 ½ by 11 inches. Front and rear cover printed in green. Black and white photos throughout. This includes pictures of the Dead Boys, Devo, the Dictators and others. Second issue of this New

York based fanzine that offered information and commentary on No Wave, punk and new wave music and musicians. This issue contains short pieces on Devo, the Dictators and the Dead Boys, as well as reviews of new records. Beat It was founded and run by Rick Brown, then a student at NYU, and Julia Gorton, then a student at Parson. Gorton was involved primarily as a photographer, documenting many of the punk and No Wave acts in York. Her work was used by NY Rocker, among other places (Moore and Cooley, p. 41-43, 137, 139). 
Various authors. No, presumed publisher. New York: no date, (1977). Black and white illustrated wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches. 28 pp. Black and white photos and clip art throughout. Issue number two of this New York fanzine that documented the bands and artists associated with the No Wave music and art scene in the city. Based at NYU and started by Chris Nelson and Jim Sclavunos, it has been attributed by some as the

source of the term 'No Wave' (Moore p. 41-43). Jim Sclavunos was an early participant in the underground music scene in New York, being part of Teenage Jesus and the Jerks. He has performed with many other bands, including Sonic Youth, and currently with Nick Cave and the Bad Seeds (Moore, Wikipedia). This issue contains articles on two notable No Wave bands, Mars and The Gynecologists, as well as discussing the punk and new wave store, Manic Panic. With brief discussion of the Boston new wave scene, as well as an anecdote of an encounter with Lydia Lunch. GOOD condition. Light browning. Insect wear along the spine and the extremities, with loss along the spine fold of the covers, as well as loss along the fore edge. Superficial loss to the surface of the front cover. 3. Zone V. Fanzine/Photozine.

Moore, Thurston; Saah, Jim (editor and photographer). Jim Saah, presumed publisher. Wheaton, MD: no date, perhaps late 1983, early 1984, based on dates within. 48 pp., including covers. A Washington, DC area punk fanzine issued by Jim Saah, a photographer from the DC area who documented the local scene, and whose work was



featured in a documentary about the DC scene, Salad Days. This zine focuses primarily on hardcore punk acts local to the area, as well as national bands, with many photos of bands such as Marginal Man, the Meatmen, Faith, Void, Flipper, Circle Jerks, Government Issue, Black Flag, Minor Threat and others. With an interview with Henry Rollins, as well as a report on the New York scene by Sonic Youth member Thurston Moore. Minor Threat family tree, charting the evolution of the band, at the rear, covering to 1983 and not mentioning their break-up. GOOD condition. 4. No Exit. The Fanzine for the Other Wave.



Steel, Tony (editor); Stark, James (photography). No Exit/Tony Steel, presumed publisher. No place or date. Believed San Francisco, ca 1977. 8 ½ by 11 inches. Single stapled at the upper left corner. Perhaps signed by Ron 'The Ripper' Greco, the bassist of Crime, on the front cover, bearing the inscription, 'Ciao Baby The Ripper,' in pen. 14 leaves, printed on single sides only. Black and white photos throughout. Believed first issue

of this fanzine, with perhaps only 2 issues ever put out. A fanzine devoted to new wave, punk and new wave fashion, featuring photos by James Stark, a pioneer photographer of the San Francisco punk scene. This issue features interviews with the various members of the band Crime, as well as reviews of songs by the Clash and others. Brief commentary on media coverage of the Sex Pistols is present, with a one page photo spread of current clothing fashions, depicted in close-up photos of a man and a woman. GOOD condition. Minor browning to the paper, with some creasing at the corners. Light foxing and browning, with minor soiling and few small spots of staining. \$200.00



5. Ripped and Torn. Issue Number 16. January 1979.

D., Tony (editor). No publisher given (Tony Drayton). London: 1979. Side stapled Black and white lettered front cover, with a blue tinted photo. Approximately 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 10 leaves, including covers. Clip art/collage and black and white photos throughout. Printing in blue, red and black ink. Produced by Tony Drayton, this zine 'covered the punk scene in both Glascow and London,' and 'was at the time recognized by other producers as a front-runner for its attempt to offer a broader understanding of punk's political agenda' (Triggs p. 57). This issue features commentary on the punk scene, an introduction and article to the band Crass, political commentary, reviews of various punk rock singles, etc. Front cover with a short, scathing piece on Johnny Rotten, insinuating he is a poser in the punk scene. GOOD condition. Some toning to the piece, with scattered wrinkling and creasing. Minor foxing and soiling. A few small chips and tears along the extremities. \$65.00

6. Ripped and Torn No. 18. Stated Christmas Memorial Issue.

Perry, Mark; Orridge, Genesis P. et al. Insult Design, publisher. London: no date, perhaps late 1979. Side stapled format with yellow printed covers. Approximately 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 16 pp., including covers. Clip art and illustrations throughout. Issue number 18 of this fanzine, this one not produced by Tony Drayton. No indication of editor is given for this issue, although the rear cover mentions that the editor had experience with Search and Destroy of San Francisco. This issue focuses primarily on urban decay, social issues, Marxism and other political thought, as well as perhaps a slight lean toward anarchy. With writing

by Genesis P-Orridge, Mark Perry and others. VERY GOOD condition with some wrinkling to the piece. Minor toning. \$50.00


7. 1st Annual Punk Magazine Awards Ceremony Poster.

No author given. Carleton, Bruce (artist). Offset printed on textured yellow paper. Printing in red and black. 11 by 17 inches. A poster promoting the perhaps ill-



fated awards ceremony held to raise money for Punk Magazine. Somewhat due to the murder of Nancy Spungen by Sid Vicious, the event grew to outsized proportions, attracting media and punks from all over New York, as well as Blondie, Joey Ramone and other punk luminaries. Drinking ensued, with the crowd coming to a near riot at the end (see John Holmstrom's much better account of the event on punk magazine's website). NEAR FINE condition with very light edgewear. \$150.00

Holmstrom, John (editor). Punk Publications. New York: 1976. Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches that unfolds into a large journal style format measuring a little over 16 inches tall by 11 inches wide. 20 pp., including covers. Provenance: although no indication is given on the magazine itself, this copy was originally in the possession of John Holmstrom. Issue number 2 of this influential New York magazine, founded by Legs McNeil and John Holmstrom. Holmstrom, a cartoonist influenced by underground comics, 'dreamed of being for the punks what Crumb had been for the hippies.' (Berniere and Primois p. 217). This issue features articles on The Talking Heads, Patti Smith, Television, etc. as well as short reviews on various punk bands, cartoons and commentary satirizing punk

culture and life in general. GOOD condition. Blue ink spatter/staining along the extremities and lower corner (seen in several copies of this). Two to three inch area of tearing along the center spine when folded. Very light toning. \$100.00


Holmstrom, John (editor). Punk Publications. New York: 1977. Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ½ inches that unfolds into a large journal style format measuring 17 inches tall by 11 inches wide. 30 pp., including covers. Issue number 11 featuring interviews or pieces on The Clash (by Anya Philips), Crime, The Dictators, John Cale, The Dead Boys, etc. Provenance: this may be Greg Shaw's copy, with a California mailing label and Gregory Shaw given as the addressee on the front cover. Greg Shaw was the founder of the fanzine 'Who Put the Bomp,' as well as founding a record label, Bomp! GOOD+ condition. Some creasing and wrinkling along the extremities. Minor soiling and toning. Mailing address label present. \$60.00

10. Search and Destroy. Rebel Youth Culture No. 10. 1978.

Burroughs, William; Ballard, J.G.; Ordway, Nico (Stephen Schwartz); Vale, V. et al. Search and Destroy, Publisher. San Francisco: 1978. Newspaper/tabloid format. 17 1/2 by 11 1/2 inches. With a center horizontal fold crease. 28 pp. Black and white photos and clip art

throughout. Devoted to covering punk and new wave bands, Search and Destroy was founded and published by V. Vale in 1977 while working at City Lights Bookstore. Vale received initial donations from Allen Ginsberg and Lawrence Ferlinghetti to finance this zine that he hoped would be 'a clone of Andy Warhol's Interview' (see interview with V. Vale on Examiner website, July 2009). Mixing interviews, articles and photos, Search and Destroy presented well-written pieces

wave music and their accompanying aesthetic. Jello Biafra called Search and Destroy 'The greatest underground zine I've ever seen in my life.' (Berniere and Primois pp. 218-219). Search and Destroy evolved into RE/Search in 1980. This is the tenth issue, featuring interviews with, and reports on the Plugz, Dead Kennedys and others. Interviews with William Burroughs and J.G. Ballard appear in this issue, as well as





Short, Jim (Breslow, Nancy). Nancy Breslow/Short Newz, Publisher. New York: 1980. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 1 pp each, printed on single sides only. A handwritten letter by Nancy Breslow to a magazine, Nart, in which she mentions giving these issues to them, and her hope to receive an issue of Nart so that she may review it. On the reverse of this letter is list of



fanzines Breslow has assembled, with addresses. Accompanied by five issues of this New York City based fanzine containing (usually) many short lines on various punk acts and news items. This includes the Slickee Boys, Human Sexual Response, etc. With reviews of various zines. VERY GOOD condition. Horizontal fold creases present. Minor toning. \$50.00





Drayton, Tony. Tony Drayton, Publisher. London: 1980. Side stapled wraps, color printed. 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 18 pages, including covers. Collage, clip art and color printing throughout. The first issue of this fanzine by Tony Drayton, the former editor/publisher of Ripped and

Torn. Kill Your Pet Puppy embraced the anarcho-punk ideals emerging from the punk rock scene that had become commercialized, discussing politics as well as bands. This issue covers Adam and the Ants and Crass, as well as the use and abuse of the drug Tuinal. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning and light wrinkling. Moore, advertising the highlights of this issue. #213 of 700. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 32 pp. Two tipped in pieces present near the center of this fanzine: one advertising a Sonic Youth show and the other advertising the movie 'Fingered' starring Lydia Lunch. These appear to be photocopied reproductions and as such may not be original. Clip art throughout. Also includes a short section of poorly reproduced nude photos of Madonna taken by Richard Kern. These are accompanied by a

brief backstory recalling her struggles in starting her art/music career in late 1970's New York. Edited and written by Thurston Moore of Sonic Youth, this fanzine served as 'an inspired excuse for to introduce himself to musicians he admired in other cities,' as well as covering both the hard core and art core music scenes (Foege. Confusion is Next: The Sonic Youth Story). Moore includes articles and interviews with other musicians, with this issue featuring an interview with Steve Albini, J. Mascis (of Dinosaur and Dinosaur Jr.), as well as promoting artists such as Lydia Lunch, Richard Kern, etc. Also featured is writing from other Sonic Youth band members, Lee Ranaldo and Kim Gordon. Most work is handwritten. Notable in this issue is the rear cover art by Raymond Pettibon who first gained notice for his artwork for the band Black Flag. His work is held in museum collections worldwide. VERY GOOD condition. Minor creasing along the spine. Light fading. Minor toning to the paper. \$150.00

Auburndale, MA: 1978. Single sheet, 14 by 8 ½ inches. Printed on a single side only. Two small photos present. A newsletter devoted to news about the Boston based punk band, Third Rail, featuring Richard Nolan and others. This issue discusses the impending release of two new singles, as well as news on bands such as the Nervous Eaters, the Tuff Darts, Dead Boys and

others. With commentary on Boston DJ Oedipus and his playing of rock and roll for five hours in a boogie-jive disco. Third Rail was featured on the Live at the Rat album, and was known for a Velvet Underground type sound. VERY GOOD condition. Horizontal and vertical fold creases present. 

Black and white photos and art throughout, including two full page pieces by Raymond Pettibon (given as Pettibone in the zine). This issue notable for a detailed history of punk rock in the L.A. area by Charles Dukowski,

a member of Black Flag. Also included are interviews with Joanna Went, Mark Pauline and a one page info sheet on the band Social Distortion. With graphic sexual imagery and language throughout. GOOD+ condition. Horizontal fold crease present. General browning to the paper. Front cover and one page within with a tear at the center fore edge. \$125.00





Billing itself as 'The People's Paper,' this issue of this proto-fanzine style work was devoted to music, providing


record reviews and pieces on Lou Reed, the New York Dolls, as well as rock bands such as Genesis and Queen. Lee Lumsden, editor and publisher of this work was the drummer for one of Seattle's first punk rock bands, Meyce, debuting May 1st, 1976, and also playing as the opening act for the Ramones in 1977. GOOD condition. Heavy fading to the ink, being very faint and hard to read in places. Minor browning to the paper. Minor wrinkling and a few small stains. \$75.00

Clip art, collage and reproduced black and white photos throughout. Issue number two of this British fanzine published from 1979 to 1981, using collage and varying typographic formats to present a visually appealing review of various punk and




new wave acts. Included are interviews and reviews of The Cure, Ruts, The Fall, The Clash, the Damned and others. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning. Some curling to the corners. Triggs p. 77. \$60.00

Side folding newspaper tabloid format. 17 by 11 ¼ inches, with a horizontal fold crease. 24 pp. Black and white photos and clip art throughout. Presumed first issue of this Olympia, Washington based fanzine. Founded by John Foster and others, the fanzine covered a variety of music genres and ran for 26 issues (A through Z), focusing on what could ostensibly be called indie music. This issue contains letters to the editor, as well as reviews for various punk and new wave music and bands. With short pieces on Theoretical Girls, an interview with Random Radar, etc. \$50.00

Logue, Kathei (editor). Various authors. Kathei Logue, Publisher. Newtonville, MA: 1979. Side stapled wraps. 8 ½ by 7 inches. 48 pp., including covers. The first issue of this Boston area fanzine, providing a witty and extensive review of the punk scene in and around Boston, as well as reviews of larger punk and new wave acts.

The editor, Kathei Logue, was a prominent figure in the Boston punk scene, managing the upstairs bar at the noted music venue, The Rat, as well as managing various punk/new wave bands. This issue contains commentary on Mission of Burma, Maps, a humorous account of Gloria Gearshift's excursion into the punk scene of New York, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning. 

Issue number three of this British fanzine devoted to punk and new wave, with this containing a short retrospective on Joy Division, accompanied by two poorly reproduced photos. Also included are pieces on Urge, Fantaccini Playground and others. About VERY GOOD condition. Cover faded, with minor discoloration to the center. First page with foxing corresponding with rubber band mounted to previous page. \$25.00

Issue number three of this Croydon, UK fanzine, containing interviews with Gang of Four and others, including interviews, taken from Slash magazine, with the Germs, U.X.A. and the Controllers. 

Approximately 8 by 11 inches. 66 pp. Color and black and white photos throughout. A commercial magazine published by Myron Fass in order to cash in on the rising popularity of punk. Despite that, the magazine still contains interesting news and information on various punk acts, including the Sex Pistols, David Bowie, Dead Boys, Iggy Pop, etc. With a review of New Wave, as well as a color pin up section featuring a photo of Blondie (Debbie Harry) and Andy Warhol, the Dead Boys, Lou Reed and others. A somewhat commercial magazine presumably designed to capitalize on the then rising popularity and mainstreaming of punk rock. With short articles and photos on bands and performers such as Blondie, Johnny Rotten, Patti Smith, Iggy Pop, the Ramones, the Dead Boys, AC/DC, etc. Color photos of the Clash, The Ramones and others. VERY GOOD condition. Slight cocking to the front cover. Minor edgewear. Some toning to the paper in the interior. \$30.00





almost perfected aesthetic of collage, clip art and typography to chronicle the punk scene in the Austin area, as well as commenting on political and popular culture topics of its time. This issue focuses on free enterprise and its role and effect on the US economy, as well as discussing the Dils, Cats and Dogs and other punk and new wave acts. VERY GOOD condition. Covers toned along the extremities. Minor creasing at the corners. \$125.00

West, Nick (editor); Various Authors. Sluggo! Industrial Collapse Issue. Issue Number 6, 1981. Sluggo Press/Nick West, Publisher. San Francisco: 1981. Plastic comb binding with textured red and yellow front cover. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 44 pp. Collage and clip art throughout. Last issue of this noted fanzine, this one published in San Francisco. This issue bears an almost complete transition to a



subject based issue, with little coverage of punk/new wave, and instead containing articles and interviews relating to the title subject of industrial collapse. Included is the board game Rocky VII: the Game of Industrial Collapse, with pieces and die in a little plastic baggy. GOOD condition. Minor toning. Organized by Hibiscus, the group began a series of performances as a cross-dressing troupe, improvising songs and acts that gained them a cult following and popularity in some mainstream media outlets. As such, most of the art within is influenced with a punk aesthetic. With contributions by Jello Biafra of the Dead Kennedys, Ruby Ray, a San Francisco area photographer who documented the punk scene for Search and Destroy and other venues. VERY GOOD+ condition.
