






Creep Strangled

Fanzine for the Blank Generation Twisted



1. The Fanzine for the Blank Generation. Issue #4. July, 1977.

Munroe, Alex; Starstruck, Sue; Urban, Peter; Zebest, Jade. Published by Alex Munroe(Jones?) and Sue Starstruck. Tustin, CA: 1977. Single stapled (upper left corner). 8 ½ by 11 inches. 10 pages, printed versos only. Black and white

photos throughout, including a full page pin-up photo of the Ramones. The Fanzine for the Blank Generation, an early woman run punk fanzine, began as an outgrowth of a failed attempt by Jones and Starstruck to form a Sex Pistols fan club (ffanzeen web blog). This issue features a lengthy interview with the Blondie; news of the Sex Pistols (Johnny Rotten being stabbed); and, coverage of the Weirdos and the Screamers. Page 7 features three photos of punk fashions by Jade Zebest, the alias for Sue Langland, a noted woman in the LA area punk scene and founder of her own fanzine. VERY GOOD condition. 2. Alex Goes to London!! Fanzine for the Blank Generation. Issue #5.

Jones, Alex; Starstruck, Sue; Urban, Peter; Belikian, Les. Published by Alex Jones and Sue Starstruck. Tustin, CA: no date, presumed mid to late 1977. Single stapled (upper left corner). 8 ½ by 11 inches. 10 pages,



printed versos only (with the exception of the rear cover). Another page, presumably from another fanzine, including, featuring a close up photo of Johnny Rotten (this page not mentioned in the contents and staple holes do not correspond with those of this zine). Black and white photos throughout, including a full page promo photo of the band The Clash. This issue primarily devoted to a trip to London taken by Alex Jones. This includes transcriptions of her phone calls and letters to Sue


Starstruck that give her impressions of the punk scene in London, with special attention to fashion and the stores, including Seditionaries (the renamed Sex, owned and run by Malcolm McLaren). Jones mentions a short encounter with several members of the Sex Pistols, apparently initiated over the return of a jacket to Steve Jones. Other articles feature a view of the punk scene in San Francisco, fan club info, etc. FAIR/GOOD condition. Last leaf (Clash pin-up) DETACHED but present.

General browning to the paper. Minor wrinkling. Small tear to the center fore-edge of the front cover. \$125.00

Ramel, Mary Alice. Mary Alice Ramel, Publisher. Chicago: 1977. Side folding zine. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 16 pp. Black and white illustrations throughout. Conceived of, written, edited and published by Mary Alice Ramel after attending a punk show at the noted Chicago club, La Mere Vipere, this zine covered the punk scene in Chicago, primarily through the La Mere venue. Early, if not the first, punk fanzine in Chicago. This issue with an interview with Joey Ramone. VERY GOOD condition.

Issue number four of this Chicago punk zine with news on Television, the Stranglers, the Police (not the British band), and other punk/new wave goings on in Chicago. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning and edgewear. \$125.00 Next six numbers-a complete run of Creep, including the newsletter issued in 1981.



First issue of this San Francisco based punk fanzine, devoted mostly to local punk acts and the Bay Area punk scene. With articles on Jar, Kleptos, Symptoms, No Sisters, a protest at city hall on May 21st, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor to moderate browning. Very small, superficial trace of insect wear to the lower front cover. \$125.00

Second issue of Creep, discussing violence, the punk scene and with interviews or coverage of The Bags, Mondellos, Mean Behavior and others. VERY GOOD with moderate browning. \$100.00

Third issue of Creep, with interviews or coverage of The Punts, Dead Kennedys, Zeros, Angry Samoans, Child's Portion and others. VERY GOOD with moderate browning. 

Fourth issue of Creep, with interviews or coverage of Geza X, VKTMS, Pink Section, the Angry Samoans on the LA punk scene, discussions of punk culture and its role/fit in society, etc. VERY GOOD with minor to moderate browning. \$100.00

9. Creep #5. Fall 1980

Creep, Mickey (editor). Various Authors. Creep Productions. San Francisco: 1980. Side stapled wraps. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 48 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. Fifth issue of Creep, transitioning to covering underground music in the Bay area, as well punk music, although this issue looking at the punk/new wave scene in general, and its transition, as well as influence on society as a whole. A piece on Crass included. VERY GOOD with minor to moderate browning. \$100.00

10. Creep Newsletter. Vol. 1. No. 1.

Various authors. Creep Productions: 1981. Side stapled. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 12 pp. Written by contributors of Creep, this newsletter features collage art and commentary on various issues, straying from punk and pondering addiction, containing poetry, etc. VERY GOOD condition. 
11. Punk Magazine. #1. January, 1976.

Holmstrom, John (editor). Punk Publications. New York: 1976. Side stapled, color illustrated, comic book style, wraps. 11 by 8 ¾ inches that unfolds into a large journal style format measuring a little over 17 inches tall by 11 inches wide. 16 pp., including covers. The first issue of

this influential New York magazine, founded by Legs McNeil and John Holmstrom. Holmstrom, a cartoonist influenced by underground comics, 'dreamed of being for the punks what Crumb had been for the hippies.' (Berniere and Primois p. 217). This issue features the cover interview with Lou Reed, conducted at a Ramones concert and providing a satirical and humorous look at the genre of rock interviews and the punk scene. With coverage of the Ramones, a piece on Marlon Brando, cartoons and commentary satirizing punk culture and life in general. GOOD condition. Several small areas of brownish staining along the upper and side edges of the exterior, as well as the lower rear cover. Faint dampstain along the spine of the front cover. Moderate sized dampstain to the last five leaves along the fore edge. Second leaf misfolded, perhaps done during the printing process. \$200.00





Issue number 6 of this fanzine featuring a photoplay/live action cartoon 'The Legend of Nick Detroit.' This consists of panels of photos starring various punk figures in a crime caper, interspersing comic style art and captions with photos. Included are Richard Hell, David Johansen, David Byrne and other notables. VERY GOOD condition. Minor



Issue number 11 featuring interviews or pieces on The Clash (by Anya Philips), Crime, The Dictators, John Cale, The Dead Boys, etc. GOOD condition. Faint dampstain along the fore edge of the piece, affecting the covers and all page in the interior. Some creasing and wrinkling along the extremities, with a few small tears. Issue 16 featuring an interview with Sid Vicious and Nancy Spungen (with a color photo), as well as one with the Boomtown Rats. Also present is a

lengthy comic 'Disco Maniac' by John Holmstrom and Ken Weiner, that envision mayhem at a disco club. VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning, a hint of soiling and light edgewear. Faint dampstain at the bottom corner and along the top edge of the last few pages. \$50.00

With a tri-fold out of punk singer/artist Niagara of Destroy All Monsters, as well as color and black and white photos, cartoons and illustrations. Issue 17 featuring pieces



on The Clash, David Johansen, Destroy All Monsters and Alice Cooper, among other musicians, with cartoons and graphics interspersed among photos. A cartoon strip by Ken Weiner is present, as well as a reimagining of the Kennedy assassination. GOOD+ condition. Minor fading and rubbing. A few small creases along the extremities. New York: 1977. 11 by 8 ¼ inches. 122 pp. A single issue of High Times magazine, notable for containing an insert of Punk Magazine. This consists of an 8 page section, in color and black and white, bearing the usual Punk cartoons and commentary, including a piece on the Ramones vs. the Dictators, an interview with Legs McNeil, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor


22. Sub Pop 5.

Pavitt, Bruce. Sub Pop, Publisher. Olympia, WA: no date. Illustrated wraps, side stapled. Cover art by Charles Burns. 16 pages including covers. 4 by 2 5/8 inches. Gray cassette in black case, with handwritten 'one' on one side of the tape in black marker. Issue five of the Sub Pop fanzine, issued as a cassette tape with paper insert included. This marked the first time that the zine was issued in cassette form, which Pavitt would continue to do, alternating between cassette and fanzine format. This endeavor would eventually lead to the establishment of the Sub Pop record label that signed acts such as Nirvana, Mudhoney and others related to the Grunge music genre, becoming a huge influence in rock music. Bruce Pavitt established Subterranean (Sub) Pop while a student at Evergreen College in Olympia. The cassette features music from Visible Targets, Beakers, Doug Kahn, Cool Rays, Pell Mell, Jungle Nausea, Oil Tasters, Church of the Subgenius, etc. NEAR FINE condition with very light toning. 

stapled photo decorated wraps. 11 3/4 by 8 ¼ inches. 20 pp. including covers. Some pages printed on single sides only. Clip art/collage and black and white photos throughout. Produced by Tony Drayton, this zine 'covered the punk scene in both Glasgow and London,' and 'was at the time recognized by other producers as a front-runner for its attempt to offer a broader understanding of punk's political agenda'



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(Triggs p. 57). This issue with coverage of the Sex Pistols, Dead Fingers,Weirdos and others. One page poster of the Sex Pistols at the rear.VERY GOOD condition. Minor toning to the paper, Offsetting/browning to the upper rear cover. \$100.00



24. Twisted. Another Rock 'n' Roll Magazine. Number One. July 1977.

Roberts, Robert (editor). Various authors. Twisted, Publisher. Seattle, WA: 1977. Photo illustrated, side stapled wraps. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 24

pp. Black and white photos throughout. First issue of this early punk fanzine from Seattle, offering nicely produced coverage of local and national punk acts, accompanied by humorous, and sometimes acerbic, commentary. Only three issues were produced. Included are pieces on the Screamers, Blondie, Iggy Pop, The Damned, the Knobs, etc. VERY GOOD condition. Minor wrinkling, fading and edgewear. 25. Strangled Four. September 1977.

Various authors. Tony Moon, Strangled, publisher. London: 1977. Side folded wraps, illustrated with small clip art in collage format. 11 ¾ by 8 ½ inches. 32 pp., including covers. Black and white photos throughout. A British punk fanzine done in the style of Mark Perry's 'Sniffin Glue,' although perhaps without quite the artistic quality of 'Sniffin Glue.'



Strangled was started by Tony Moon upon being asked by the Stranglers PR man Alan Edwards to produce a zine devoted to the group. It was published until 1996. Moon also founded the fanzine Sideburns. With articles on the Who, Lurkers and others, as well as other various topics. VERY GOOD condition. General fading to the piece, presumably from poor production quality. Light edgewear. (Poynor. published from 1977-1980, and from which the record label Slash Records grew (Triggs, p. 66). Claude Bessy, a senior editor at Slash stated 'It started as a bluff, we were pretending there was an L.A. scene when there was no scene whatsoever. The magazine was it.' (Berniere and Primois p. 219). Issue eleven, featuring an interview with Malcolm McLaren, the (former) Sex Pistols manager and figure in the fashion world; commentary on the punk world in London



(Sex Pistols, etc.) by Tony D., presumably of the fanzine Ripped and Torn; etc. GOOD condition. Moderate browning to the paper. Horizontal (slightly diagonal) fold crease present, with a few other minor creases present. Slight curl to the fanzine along the fold crease. Minor soiling. A few small tears present along the extremities. \$70.00






Stabb, John. John Stabb, Publisher. No place or date, circa 1980. 8 ½ by 11 inches. Three leaves, printed on single sides only. Printed on waxy style paper. Although unattributed, this is the first fanzine by John Stabb, a Washington DC area based punk musician, best known as the front man for Government Issue. With poorly reproduced clip art on the front cover, the interior offers Stabb's profanity laced perspective on the DC punk/hardcore scene, giving good reviews to the recently formed Minor Threat, Black Market Baby and others. GOOD+ condition. Diagonal crease to the lower left corner. Minor soiling and toning. Tiny stain to the lower front center edge. \$150.00

Stabb, John. John Stabb, Publisher. No place or date, circa 1980. 8 ½ by 11 inches Five leaves, printed on single sides only. Printed on waxy style paper. Front cover clip art, with two photos of Bad Brains on the last leaf. Second issue of this Washington DC punk/hardcore fanzine, featuring John Stabb's opinions on a punk show featuring Minor Threat, among others, as well as reviews of



Fourth issue of this British fanzine produced by Geoff Banks, a writer for NME, Sounds and other venues in the 1970s and 80s. Teenage Depression covered punk and rock/metal

acts, with this issue with coverage/interviews of The Boys, Ultravox, Aerosmith, The Dictators, The Motors, Ramones and Sex Pistols gossip, etc. GOOD+ condition. Minor soiling and edgewear. Moderate toning along the extremities. \$80.00



Various authors. Great Bhang Theory, Publisher. Deerfield, FL: 1980. Side folding tabloid newspaper format. Approximately 15 by 11 ½ inches. 24 pp including covers. Black and white photos throughout. Founded and published by David (Daze) Parsons, this was the first



South Florida punk fanzine, covering a thriving punk scene in South Florida from late 1978 to 1980 or 81. Parsons moved to New York City in 1981, founding Ratcage records and issuing the Beastie Boys first punk vinyl record (see Wikipedia for previous information). This issue contains articles and news (with photos) on The Clash, Public Image Ltd., Smegma and others. VERY GOOD condition. Minor to moderate





Mullen also booked a variety of acts at the Club Lingerie in L.A. throughout the 1980s. Slush gives a well written, witty, and somewhat acerbic review of the



punk scene in Los Angeles and the surrounding area, often employing an ironic tone to the pieces, and skewering many acts and people associated with the scene, as well as punk culture as a whole. This issue features pieces on the Circle Jerks, 'Punk Rock Violence?' a somewhat lengthy section devoted to Inland Northern/Central O.C. bands, the Crowd/Weirdos, The Bags, Dez(Black Flag), Angry Samoans, the Germs and others.
