


Girls to the Front: Zines by Women

Bookseller's true confessions: originally this catalog was intended to feature only riot grrrl zines. We failed. It turns out they can be hard to find, with reprints abounding, many squirreled away in various special or private collections, and a myriad of other excuses we came up with to save face. All was not lost for us, as we did find some. In an effort to preserve our status within the high-pressure bookselling niche of zines, we've included precursors to what we guess should be called the cursors.

So, what is it we have to offer? A collection of zines that reflect the importance and influence of women in underground publishing, especially in the world of zines. This includes a pre-precursor women's prison "zine" from 1937; photos of the Slits in concert (fyi, not a zine); the final issue of Jolt by Lucy Toothpaste; a sampling of Roller Derby from our hometown of Dover, New Hampshire,* written by Dover's own luminary, Lisa Carver (Suckdog); Two issues of I'm So Fucking Beautiful, and others.

Pre-Precursor



[1] Greenwich Gazette. November 1938

Various authors. Inmates at the House of Detention, New York City. New York: 1938. Side stapled format. 8 ½ by 11 inches. 10 pp., including cover and blank last leaf. Front cover an illustration of a Thanksgiving type scene. Illustration of a woman's fashion in the interior.

A zine style work issued by women held at the House of Detention for Women at 10 Greenwich Avenue in New York, providing a means of expression for those incarcerated. Initially the prison was conceived of as a humane place for

rehabilitation, and was established in an Art Deco style building built in 1931. However, by the 1960s, conditions had deteriorated, and it earned a reputation for inhumane conditions, partially due to inedible food and a large infestation of rats. The prison was closed in 1971 (see University of Notre Dame blog on writing to rehabilitate, discussing a 1939 issue of this zine). This issue contains poetry, essays and other musings, including a piece worrying about Adolf Hitler and his rise to power in Germany. Margaret Levine includes a poem satirizing a special prosecutor. With contributions by Bell Gilbert, Jenny Bennett, Katherine Murphy and others.

No photographer known. Photos measure 5 ¼ by 3 ½ inches.

Uncertain of provenance, although according to a previous owner, these may

The Slits were an influential punk band from England, with their debut album Cut considered one of the best postpunk albums of all time. Photo quality varies, with some being a bit overexposed or underexposed. That said, they all do well

in capturing the energy of a Slits live performance.

Toothpaste (Whitman), Lucy. Lucy Toothpaste, Publisher. No place or date, presumed circa 1977. Single stapled photomechanically

reproduced pages. 11 ¾ by 8 ¼ inches. 15 leaves, printed on single sides only. Black and white illustrations and photos throughout.

Lucy Toothpaste(Whitman) wrote her fanzine as an attempt to 'engage with antracist and feminist issues.' as well as politics through the lens of punk (see Cazz Blase's interview with Lucy Whitman on the f word website). As Matthew Worley notes, "Having taken her feminism into punk, she then took her punk into feminism via RAS and contributions to Spare Rib. By so doing, Whitman contributed to a continuum



that fed through RAR, RAS, Shocking Pink, riot grrrl and onto the burgeoning feminist punk scenes of the twenty-first century," (Worley, Ripped Torn and Cut, p. 59.) Last issue, featuring pieces on the X-Ray Spex and Poly Styrene, the Buzzcocks and others. She also tackles the potential fascist undertone in punk music, including the adoption of Nazi imagery by some punks.


Third issue of this fanzine started by Sarah Shosubi partly because she "wanted to get 'involved.' The whole feeling at the time was you had to do something. We felt something special, part of a new thing, which was very radical-underground." (See Marko, The Roxy London Wc2: a Punk History, page 120). Shosubi provided the Slits with rehearsal space, and used the zine as part of her effort to "create"

punk rather than merely consume it," (Blase, Ripped, Torn and Cut, p. 79). This issue features several pages of photos, interviews and pieces on The Clash, as well as photos/article on Generation X, the Heartbreakers, The Jam and others.

Jones, Alex; Starstruck, Sue; Urban, Peter. Published by Alex Jones and Sue Starstruck. Tustin, CA: 1977. Single stapled (upper left corner). 8 ½ by 11 inches. 10 pages, printed rectos only. Black and white photos throughout, including a full page promo photo of the band Blondie.

Published and put together primarily by Alex Jones-'I am not a guy!' and Sue Starstruck, two young women from the Los Angeles area, the Fanzine for the Blank Generation began as an outgrowth of a failed attempt by Jones and Starstruck to form a Sex Pistols fan club (ffanzeen web blog). This issue features an excerpt from a radio interview with the Sex Pistols, conducted by Rodney Bingenheimer of KROQ, with a photo

caption of Sid Vicious indicating he was the 'new drummer of the Sex Pistols.' Also present is a review of a John Cale show, a philosophical piece on punk, do's and don'ts of punk fashion and a pin-up of Johnny Rotten.

Black and white photos throughout, including a full page promo photo of the band The Clash.

This issue of Fanzine for the Blank Generation is primarily devoted to a trip to London taken by Alex Jones. This includes transcriptions of her phone calls and letters to Sue Starstruck that give her impressions of the punk scene in London, with special attention to fashion and the stores, including Seditionaries (the renamed Sex, owned and run by Malcolm McLaren). Jones mentions a short encounter with several members of the Sex Pistols, apparently initiated over the return of a jacket to Steve Jones. Other articles feature a view of the punk scene in San Francisco, fan club info, etc.

Started anonymously as a gossip rag in 1975, Miss Lyn continued to issue the Boston Groupie News from issue 2, working anonymously (although people in the Boston scene suspected it was her). Miss Lyn offered an inside look at the music scene in Boston, especially the punk and new wave acts in and around the city, providing often acerbic and witty commentary on the bands and the scene. It is still in existence today, as an online venue (Boston Groupie News website for a history, etc.). Usual brief reviews, news and quips on the local scene, as well as an interview with Thundertrain, the new Third Rail single, etc.





Lisa Carver is an American performance artist whose work explores transgressive sex, gender politics and other subjects. She was part of the underground band/troupe had their Suckdog, who performed opera that "always had lots of rape, murder cassette haby

This issue offers a critique of lingerie catalogs, a recounting of Carver's early sexual experiences, an interview with Vaginal Crème Davis and Glen Meadmore, etc.

Second issue of this zine by activist and musician Nomy Lamm. Lamm "writes of her anger and disillusionment with sizeism in this small, typewritten, and hand illustrated zine. She addresses issues of discrimination, ignorance, and 'fat' jokes, and reclaims the word 'fat' to refer to herself," (Worldcat entry on this zine). Lamm was part of the queercore music scene in Olympia, Washington in the early 1990s, and has been an activist on the issue of fat acceptance. Her writing in "I'm So

Fucking Beautiful" was at the forefront of the literature of fat/body acceptance, prefiguring the field of study that arose in the 2000s. Some portions of her zine were anthologized in the 2013 work, "The Riot Grrrl Collection."



SXE subcultures because I find them to be a large part of my life." Along with her musings and reflections, she includes an interview with Universal Order of Armageddon, reviews, etc.

Issue 2 of The Flying Bitch Sisters, ostensibly devoted to "The very latest in...female fashions." Subtle allusions to fashion throughout, along with poetry, cultural commentary, collage art, etc. Includes contributions by Constance, Ethel Vie, A.E. Powers, Caitlin and Kelina.



Morrow was a member of Riot Grrrl NYC before starting this zine. A signed, typed letter from Diana is laid in, addressed to Diane (presumably Diane Anderson-Minshall, founder of the Girlfriends women's magazine), thanking her for reviewing Princess. This issue with articles such as "strategies of lesbian representation;" an interview with Carol Lipnik; Breast/Plates by Hanna Fushihara; sexism in indie rock; CuntMachine by Josie; an interview with Kathleen Hanna of Bikini Kill; "some of us have had to eat to learn we were hungry;" "the Bible and homosexuality;" a photo spread by Diana Morrow, etc.



Debut issue of Darby's long running zine, Ben is Dead. As Darby notes, she started the zine as a "forum and an escape," eventually using it as a vehicle to explore the world and a variety of experiences. While earlier issues tended to cover punk music and the punk scene, the zine eventually grew to cover a range of women's experiences and pop culture in general. (Green [editor] p. 70). This

issue reviews local punk shows, new releases, interviews a teenage punk girl, provides satire on a variety of subjects, etc.


